CURRENT SITUATION

The State Emergency Operations Center is currently at Level 1 Activation as the Unified Wilma Command continues to prepare and respond to Hurricane Wilma.

Miami-Dade

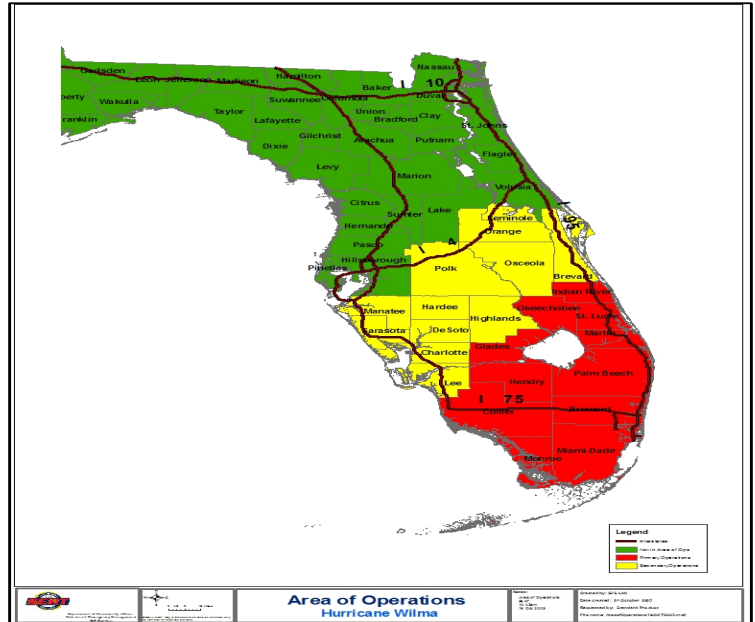
Tonight: Mostly clear with lows in the mid 50s inland to the upper 50s near the coast. North winds 10 to 15 mph.

Tonight: Mostly clear with lows around 50. North winds 10 to 15 mph and will be decreasing to 5 to 10 mph after midnight.

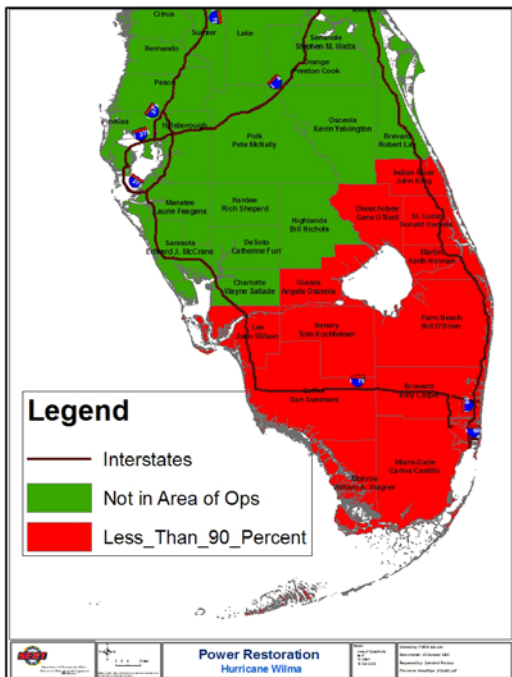
CONSEQUENCES:

1. **Evacuation** – Several counties issued evacuation orders during the impact of Hurricane Wilma.

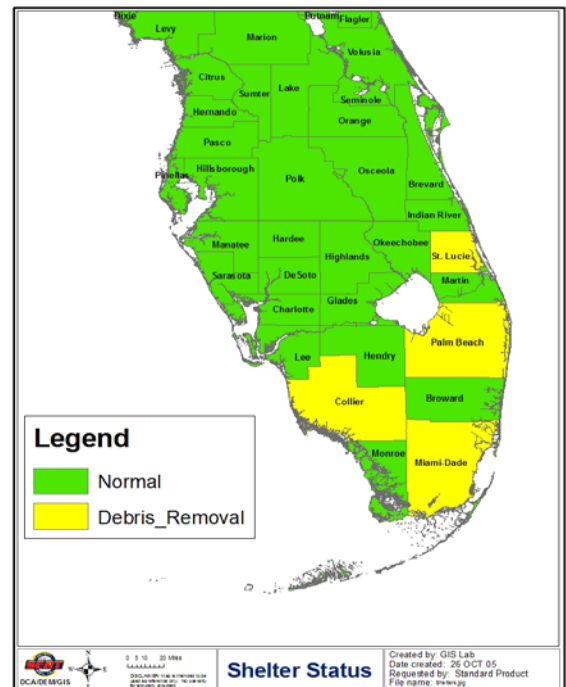
2. **Sheltering** – Currently there are **27** shelters open with **3,328** evacuees with **420** Special Needs evacuees. (10/26/05 @ 1900 hours)
3. **School Closings** – Currently there are several counties with school closures. (see updated county chart)
4. **Boil Water Notices** – Boil water notices have been issued for the following: Collier, Broward, Monroe, Palm Beach, Lee, Miami-Dade, Martin, Okeechobee, Hendry, Brevard and Glades.
5. **Fatalities and Injuries**—Currently there are 8 confirmed fatalities: Collier (3), St. Johns (1), Miami-Dade (2), and Broward (2). There is 1 injury in Indian River County and 1 injury in Collier County.
6. **Currently the following counties have hotel availability:** Collier (0 rooms), Seminole (500 rooms), Osceola (1,000 rooms), Polk (1,138 rooms), Lee (37 rooms), Hillsborough (2,243 rooms), Pinellas (2,300 rooms), Indian River (500 rooms), Hardee (10 rooms), St. Lucie (20 rooms), Highlands (120 rooms), Glades (12 rooms), Charlotte (20 rooms), Broward (2,000 rooms), Miami-Dade (551 rooms), Brevard (2,500 rooms), Hernando (10 rooms), Columbia (full), Marion (75-100 rooms) and Orange (9,400 rooms). 7. **Power Outages:** Currently there are **2,659,024** residents without power due to damages caused by Hurricane Wilma. (as of 10/26/05 @ 1900 hrs)
8. **Several counties have issued curfews:** Palm Beach (7:00pm-5:00am), Martin (7:00pm-7:00am), Glades (Dusk to Dawn), Brevard (Dusk to Dawn), St. Lucie (7:00pm- 7:00am), Broward (7:00am-7:00pm), Collier (10:00pm- 6:00am), Hendry (6:00pm- 6:00am), Indian River (6:00pm-8:00am), Okeechobee (Dusk to Dawn).

Monroe

Power has been restored to almost 70% of the county. Per Florida Key Aqueduct, main break has been located, found to be in the vicinity of a local hotel and has been shutdown or repaired. Isolated leaks have been found, inclusive a quarter size hole that has not been repaired. A precautionary boil water notice has been issued. Transportation is cleared countywide. Traffic Lights are out. Stops sign are staged on majority of traffic lights. Hospitals are currently open with the following status: Key West Int'l Airport will be open tomorrow for daylight operation only. Lighting is not fully restored on runways. Land lines telephones are still down. Approximately 54 rental vehicles will be available. (30 available now + 24 coming in tomorrow). Marathon Airport has reported a clear run way, for daylight operation only. There is a severe lighting problem. 25,000 MRE's were served today at one of the shelter (Coral Shores High School), however, when citizens returned for shelter, it had been closed, due to lack of staff. Sugarloaf Elementary school shelter was also closed due to lack of staff. Coordination on local school buses underway, awaiting confirmation for wheel chair capability bus. Approximately 12 to 20 law enforcement vehicles were lost.

- The State Emergency Response Team continues to monitor the progress of Hurricane Wilma

- Volunteer & Donations Hotline operational daily between 8AM and 8PM (1-800-FLHELP1)

- Washout 300 ft of sidewalk along A1A at about MP20
- Signal – 40% out due to no power
- 40% sustained some damages

District 6

- Power is still a major problem in the district
- Inspections of bridges have been completed
- Significant sign, signal and debris issues throughout the district
- US 1 to the Keys is open – local
- EOC is running from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.
- Florida's Turnpike is open to traffic in its entirety, from US 1 (Exit 1) in Florida City to Interstate 75 (Exit 309) in Wildwood
- A preliminary damage assessment shows a significant number of cantilever signs, post mounted signs and trees down
- All Turnpike service plazas—from the Snapper Creek Service Plaza at Milepost 19 to the Okahumpka Service Plaza at Milepost 299—are open, although some have limited services available
- Turnpike service plazas in Miami-Dade, Broward, Palm Beach and Martin counties have fuel but motorists are experiencing long lines of up to three hours
- Gasoline purchases are limited to \$20.00 per vehicle, NOT per person, to allow as many customers as possible to obtain an allocation of fuel
- **Turnpike Road Ranger Program:**
- Has ten (10) trucks operating within the area of Hurricane Wilma impact
- These trucks are equipped with 50 gallon tanks for distribution of gasoline to stranded motorists on the Turnpike System
- Post hurricane, these Road Rangers have limited the free gas to one gallon to each stranded motorist in an effort to stretch limited supplies
- On average, each Road Ranger has refilled their 50 gallon tanks twice during each day of operation, which began as soon as conditions allowed on Monday
- As a result, approximately 2500 gallons of fuel will have been provided to motorists stranded on the Turnpike by end of operations on Wednesday
- There is a \$20 maximum allocation of fuel per VEHICLE...not per person
- This will buy approximately seven and a half gallons of fuel
- Motorist could expect to burn this much fuel waiting in line at the pumps
