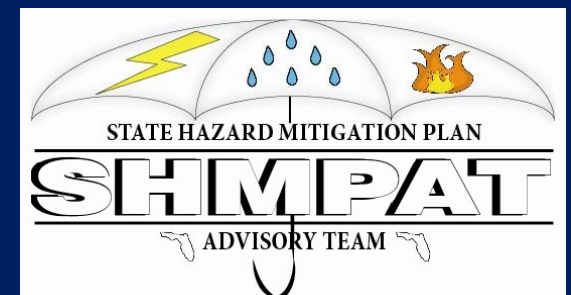

- CDBG can be used as a match to many federal grants



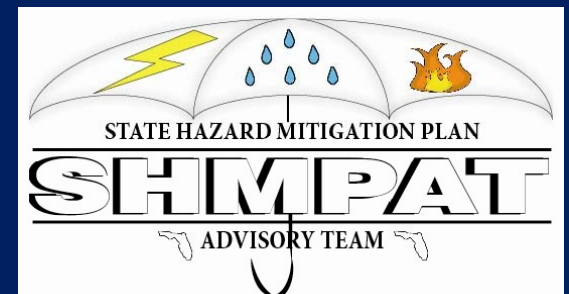

- 13 forms initially completed



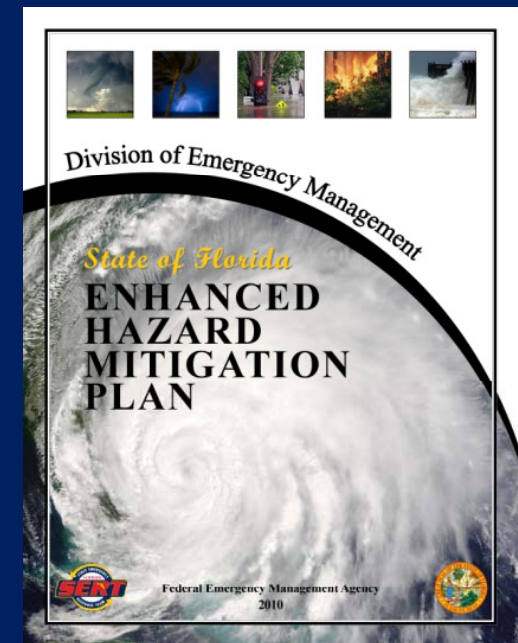
Activity Findings

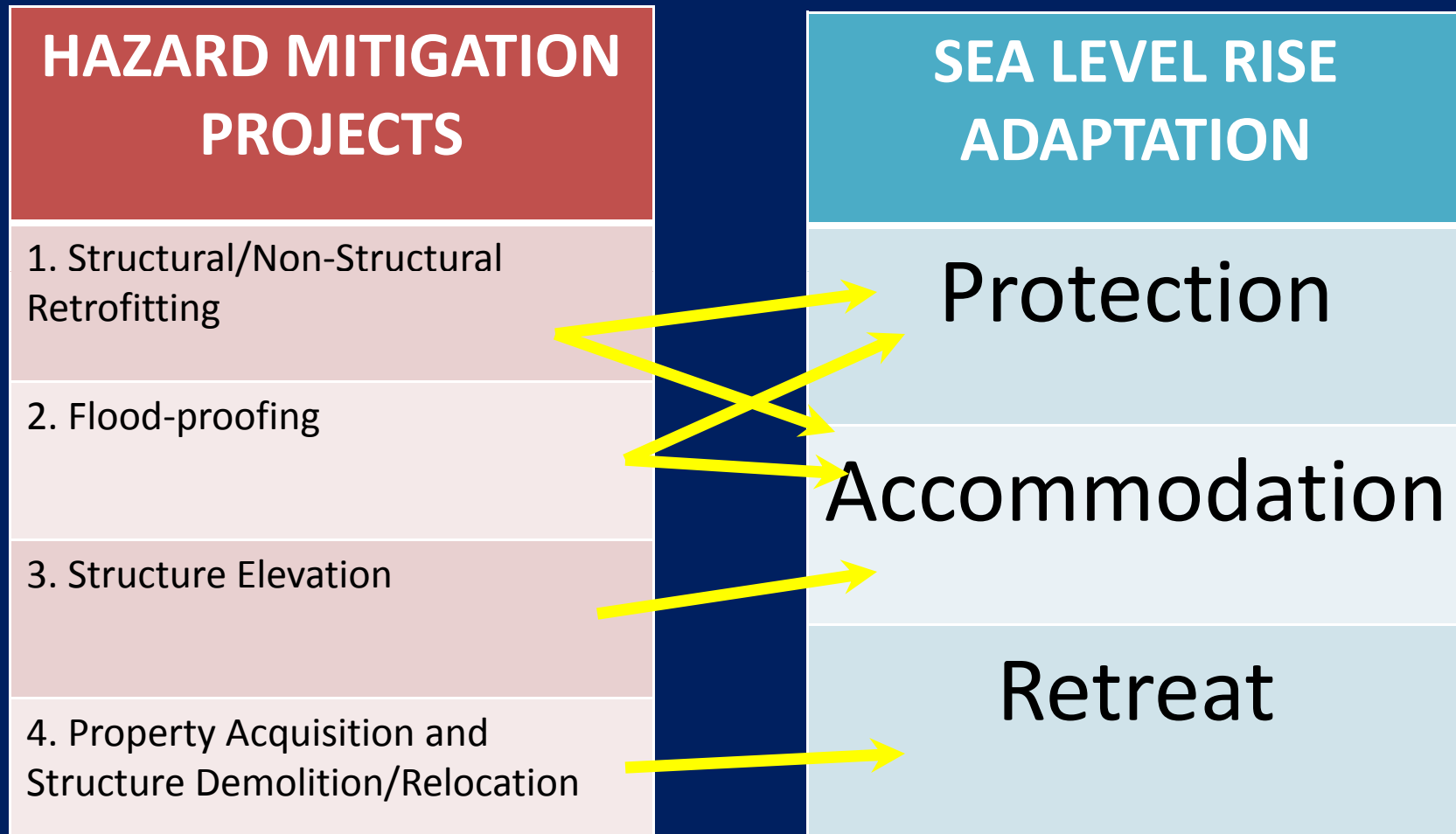
Potential to Increase Community Vulnerability



Impacts to Communities

- Increased flooding and drainage problems
- Destruction of natural resource habitats
- Higher storm surge, increased evacuation areas and evacuation time frames
- Increased shoreline erosion
- Saltwater Intrusion
- Loss of infrastructure and existing development

Five Year Project

- 1st Year: Research, Partnership Building
- 2nd Year: Draft/Pilot
- 3rd Year: Lessons Learned/Outreach
- 4th Year: Outreach & Implementation
- 5th Year: Outreach & Implementation

1st Year Tasks

- Inventory and review existing sea level rise projects from other states and all technical assistance related to community resiliency available to local governments.
- Form a Statewide Focus Group to provide oversight and guidance for 5-Year Project.
- Determine appropriate methodology and parameters for the work to be conducted.

SITE



- Challenges:
 - Difficulty making contact with the correct parties regarding specific projects identified in SHMP
 - In some cases, agency goals were provided to the SHMP and have been entered for tracking. Overall concepts can be difficult to measure and keep track of
- Benefits:
 - Getting better insight into mitigation activities being done at other agencies
 - Able to share completed and in progress projects with SHMPAT members
