It's the first day of Severe Weather Awareness Week! #FLSWAW is a great opportunity to learn about & prepare for natural hazards that impact Florida.


Today's focus is lightning! If you can hear thunder, you can be struck by lightning.

Whenever possible, swim at a lifeguardprotected beach



Pay attention to beach warning flags



Swim 100+ ft. away from piers and jetties to avoid rip currents

Carrier Today is Day 2 of Severe Weather Awareness Week! Today's #FLSWAW focus is marine hazards & rip currents. #DYK: On an average year, rip currents claim the lives of more Floridians than hurricanes, tornadoes & lightning combined.

Wednesday, February 7: Thunderstorms & Tornadoes

At approximately 10:00 a.m. EST, the National Weather Service will issue a practice Tornado Warning. The Warning will be broadcast on NOAA Alert Radio as a "routine weekly test" message. For the Florida Panhandle counties within the Central time zone, all drill activities will be repeated one hour earlier (9:00 a.m. CST).

This drill is voluntary. School districts, private schools, preschools and daycare centers are encouraged to participate in the drill. On the morning of the drill, all participants should consider themselves under a Tornado Watch. A Watch means you should monitor the weather and be prepared to go to a safe place in the event of a Warning.

Copy to post to Social Media Channels early in the morning before the alert goes out:

Practice safety plans & seek shelter as if a tornado was in the area. School districts, private schools, preschools & daycare centers are encouraged to participate! #FLSWAW



Know the signs of a tornado:

Strong, consistent rotation in a cloud base

Loud, continuous roar or rumble that doesn't fade quickly like thunder

Whirling dust or debris on the ground under a cloud base

* Severe cold outbreaks occur in Florida at least once a year. Know the 5 P's of cold weather preparedness to stay safe & warm during colder months

PROTECT PETS Bring outdoor pets inside or provide a warm shelter for them.

> Dress in warm layers & wear a **PROTECT PLANTS**

Cover cold-sensitive plants to protect them from dangerous temperatures.



PROTECT PEOPLE

PROTECT PIPES

Cover pipes & allow outdoor faucets to slowly drip to prevent them from freezing & breaking.



PRACTICE FIRE SAFETY

Use safe heating sources indoors. Don't use fuel-burning devices such as grills; they release deadly carbon monoxide.
